Director IQAC introduced two new IQAC members, Dr. Dharmendra Pandey, Head-Quality Assurance along with Ms. Sheetal Barde, Associate Professor, SCON, and Head of Criteria-V, Student Support and Progression.

Dr. Dharmendra Pandey informed all members about his previous work experience in quality management in higher education.

Dr. Asmita Dani, Director of Academics was also welcomed as she has joined SIU recently. Dr. Asmita Dani gave a brief introduction to her academic career.

Director IQAC took up the agenda points for discussion.

Mr. Pradeep Bhargava, nominee from management appreciated the IQAC activity where the constituents and departments present and share the best practices and quality initiatives of the respective constituents and departments.



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## **ITEM NO.1**

**To confirm the minutes of the 39<sup>th</sup> IQAC Meeting held on 22<sup>nd</sup> September, 2022.**

Minutes of the 39<sup>th</sup> IQAC Meeting held on 22<sup>nd</sup> September, 2022 were discussed and confirmed.

## **ITEM NO.2**

**Review of Action Taken Report (ATR) of the 39<sup>th</sup> IQAC Meeting held on 22<sup>nd</sup> September, 2022.**

Members were briefed on the action taken report of the points discussed in the 39<sup>th</sup> IQAC meeting held on 22<sup>nd</sup> September, 2022.

Mentioned ATR pointers were explained in depth to all the members by Director IQAC.

- Director IQAC highlighted that Mr. Jivesh Govil, nominee from employer will guide Prof. Harshad Gune for the improvement of DMC w.r.t. handling of data centrally.
- Dr. Bhama Venkataramani, raised a point on Digi Locker and Academic Bank of Credits (ABC). Hon'ble Vice-Chancellor gave a brief about ABC and explained how it works. Given below is the present status of ABC at SIU.  
SIU continues to build a transformative educational experience for students and its academic community, aligning with the NEP 2020. Following the UGC guidelines, SIU is taking the necessary steps to familiarize stakeholders and institutionalize the ABC across its constituents. SIU registered for the ABC with registration number ABC0036331627806802. With the implementation of ABC, SIU is poised to accomplish the ABC goals, such as allowing students to tailor their programmes and facilitating horizontal mobility across HEIs.
- Mr. Pradeep Bhargava raised a point on interdepartmental disciplinary research and technology transfer. He wanted SIU to encourage both by giving attractive incentives for it.
- Hon'ble Vice Chancellor suggested that they can have a group of good researchers who can be groomed by Mr. Pradeep Bhargava for technology transfer as there is potential in this.

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## **ITEM NO.3**

### **To inform about the status of AQAR for A.Y 2020-21 and A.Y 2021-22.**

Director IQAC updated about the AQAR status. He mentioned that as per NAAC, the revised deadline for all pending AQAR's including the A.Y 2021-22 is 28<sup>th</sup> February 2023. AQAR for A.Y 2020-21 has been submitted on 30<sup>th</sup> December 22.

The preparation of AQAR for A.Y 2021-22 is in process. The necessary information about the same is communicated to all stakeholders. QMB has initiated a series of online training on the AQAR 2021-22 process and it has been well received by constituents. AQAR introduction session had 256 participants. Criterion-I session had 130, Criterion-II had 100, Criterion-III had 104, Criterion-IV had 131, Criterion-V had 84, Criterion-VI had 115 and Criterion-VII had 108 participants.

## **ITEM NO.4**

### **To discuss the proposed initiatives by Criterion Head of Criterion-I Curricular Aspects and the way forward w.r.t NAAC Cycle-4.**

Dr. Abhijit Chirputkar, Director of Symbiosis Institute of Digital and Telecom Management (SIDTM) and Head of Criteria-I discussed following Criteria-I metrics.

- 1. National, regional and local initiatives:** Curricula developed and implemented have relevance to the local, national, regional and global developmental needs, which is reflected in the Programme outcomes (POs), Programme Specific Outcomes (PSOs) and Course Outcomes (COs) of the Programmes offered by the University. The SIU has specific guidelines for this criterion and we are also proposing the new insights to this clause to be implemented across all the programs under SIU to comply with these guidelines. This carries 20 marks to the University and an important point in Criterion-I.
- 2. Value Added Courses (VAC) at SIU (Criteria 1.3.2 and 1.3.3):** SIU has devised guidelines in relation to Value Added Courses to be offered to students and the same is implemented in all the constituents. These two metrics deals with offering of VAC to students and how many students have enrolled and completed these courses. These VAC should basically deal with transferrable and life skills offered to the students. This carries 20 marks to the University and is an important metric in Criteria-I.

Mr. Pradeep Bhargava suggested while creating VAC, SIU should align it with National level policies.

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Dr. Abhijit Chirputkar, Hon'ble Vice-Chancellor Madam and Dr. Pravin Dange, Head - Academics gave a detailed information about the Value-Added Courses (VAC) and its operational guidelines. The types of VAC were also discussed.

Below mentioned are operational guidelines for VAC

- VAC be identified and delivered at the institute level. The institutes should plan and decide VAC in advance based on the feedback from the stakeholders. The institute should prepare a brochure, get it approved from PRC, QIC. It should be formed as a part of the catalogue of SIU.
- VAC is not charged to the students.
- SIU plans to devise its own VAC in due course of time like "Vasudhaiva Kutumbakam" or SIU MOOCs.
- All the VAC must be assessed.
- For online VAC, the institutes can refer to only AICTE/NPTEL/SWAYAM courses.
- The certificate to be given to the students in the standard format post successful completion of the VAC assessment.
- The minimum number of VAC should be one in each semester /four in a two-year programme
- As per the recent UGC guidelines on curriculum and credit framework for undergraduate program, 2022: Value added courses will be common to all UG students and for 3 years / 4 years UG program the VAC will be 6-8 credits.

Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) integration of Symbiosis School of Economics (SSE) with programmes, projects and other student activities were appreciated by Director IQAC.

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## **ITEM NO. 5**

**To discuss the proposed initiatives by the Criterion Head of Criterion-II Teaching Learning and Evaluation and the way forward w.r.t NAAC Cycle-4.**

Dr. Parimala Veluvali, Director of Symbiosis School for Online and Digital Learning (SSODL) and Head of Criteria-II discussed below pointers of Criteria-II metrics.

- 1. Framing of university policy and guidelines on assessments of learning levels of the students, devising strategies for advanced and slow learners, and mechanisms to monitor their effectiveness:** Presently, each constituent follows its policy on learner diversity and undertakes initiatives for advanced and slow learners. To bring in some uniformity and consistency in the methodology applied for assessment and to provide guidance to institutes on measuring the effectiveness of the strategies, it is important to devise a broad framework at the University level.  
A committee to be constituted by the QMB to frame a policy for SIU to be implemented from the A.Y 2023-2024

There was a discussion on mentioned points by the members

- The identification is to be done as per NAAC expectations i.e. 'Early assessment of learning levels'.
  - All members recommended 'course wise' allocation/classification should be made for advanced and slow learners.
  - Members recommended SIU should have a centralized Mentor Mentee policy. QMB will initiate the formulation of the Mentor Mentee policy through Students Welfare
- 
- 2. The review of the University policy on Outcome Based Education:** Currently SIU has adopted Outcome Based Education (OBE) for its programmes with the intent of establishing a virtuous cycle of academic quality improvement where outcomes are defined, the curriculum is designed and delivered to meet the outcomes, performance on the outcomes are assessed, and lessons learned from the outcome attainment analytics is used to improve curriculum design and delivery.  
Presently only direct measures are applied for measuring outcomes attainment. Indirect measures may help explain results obtained from a direct assessment, as well as give insights into how students/alumni perceive aspects of our programs. It is therefore suggested that the current policy of OBE be reviewed and evaluate the need and feasibility of indirect measures of outcome attainment to be included in OBE. Academic department to initiate the review of this policy.

Few key initiatives that have brought significant quality improvements at SIU are given below

1. Symbiosis Institute of Computer Studies & Research (SICSR) has come up with a creative initiative. The constituent made use of International names for various quality initiatives. The names used are Chishiki (knowledge), Sameeksha (evaluation), Pravidhi (technology), Informatica (computing), Hurukuro (conservation), Pencerahan (enlightenment), Forschung(research) and Keiken(experience).
2. Research cell of Symbiosis School for Liberal Arts, Pune (SSLA) came with a new initiative 'Research Café'. The idea of a 'Research Cafe' is different from a workshop. In a research cafe, there will be no lectures, and the facilitator is not expected to initiate guided activities on the topic. Participants are expected to bring an ongoing research project where



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they are using or plan to use the specific method or framework of analysis or the issue under consideration in a cafe. Participants must submit a working proposal (proposal for an ongoing research project) at least a couple of days before the session.

3. Symbiosis Statistical Institute (SSI) started with 'Institute Research day celebration'. It will be celebrated in the month of November every year. This will help to inculcate a research environment among students of SSI and provide an opportunity to share and present their research ideas and get inputs from experts for fruitful outcomes. SSI also organised Dr. Hujurbazar memorial lecture series which will start in the month of October for A.Y 2023-24. The broad objective of this memorial lecture is to promote statistical understanding by reaching out to larger communities.
4. Symbiosis Institute of Technology (SIT) came up with an innovative Teaching and Learning processes with different evaluation methods. Computer Science branch has started open book evaluation on coding where students are referring different websites during problems. Hackers rank and reflex assignment in the journal are the few new evaluation methods adopted. SIT for the 1<sup>st</sup> time conducted a 21 days induction program for B. Tech 1st year students of the 2022-26 batch, where the Universal Human Values module (AICTE UHP module) has been adopted. It covered six value-aided courses. After completion of this induction program, all the participants received certificates. SIT has collaborated with IIT Bombay for "spoken tutorials".

### **ITEM NO. 7**

**To discuss the approval of proposed journals of Symbiosis College of Nursing (SCON) and Symbiosis Centre for Management & Human Resource Development (SCMHRD) for the submission to UGC CARE.**

Total of four journals are proposed for submission to UGC CARE, one from SCON and three from SCMHRD. Hon'ble Vice Chancellor suggested that the process needs to be laid down for the approval of proposed and upcoming journals of SIU. A procedure integrating UGC guidelines will be developed collaboratively by QMB and SCRI.

## **Resolution Item No.7: IQAC: 09.01.2023**

*Resolved that QMB and SCRI will create a procedure for review of journals for submission to UGC CARE.*



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## **ITEM NO. 8**

### **To discuss about the Academic developments at SIU.**

Dr. Asmita Abhijit Dani, Director of Academics informed about the recent academic developments and plan of action for next quarter.

She acknowledged the improvements brought to the department by Dr. Pravin Dange through his contribution to the digitization of processes.

She apprised all the members about the progress of the implementation of four-year UG programs at SIU. She also updated that four-year programmes will be launched from AY 2023-24 as per the guidelines. For the programs governed by statutory councils will be proceeded as per guidelines issued by them.

Dr. Bhama explained multiple entry and exit options for student mobility and shared the preparedness and discussed the challenges.

- 1. Symbiosis Centre for Medical Image Analysis (SCMIA)**
- 2. Symbiosis Statistical Institute Pune | SSI- Pune**

**The first presentation was done by Dr. Bhushan Borotikar, Head of the Symbiosis Centre for Medical Image Analysis.**

The Head of Symbiosis Centre for Medical Image Analysis started with a self-introduction followed by functions of the department in which they have two domains i.e. Clinical and Technical domains. The aim and vision of SCMIA were explained to all the members. The complete funding structure of International and Indian government agencies was also explained.

SCMIA has published papers in International Journals with an average impact factor of 4.98.

SCMIA presented their quality monitoring mechanism elements

- Quality in Research Proposals
- Quality in Ongoing Research Projects
- Quality in Research Publications
- Quality in Mentoring
- Quality in Collaborative Research



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## The second presentation was given by Dr. Sharvari Shukla, Director of Symbiosis Statistical Institute (SSI)

Director SSI, presented quality initiatives and informed about the collaborative publications done by SSI students and faculties.

### Quality Initiatives at SSI

- **Stats-Buddy:** The objective was to enable (non-stats) students to have one SSI student as their Stat-Buddy who can help them understand, analyse and interpret the collected data, as this would lead to usefulness, awareness and encourage students and faculty members for inter-disciplinary and collaborative research activities.
- **SankhyaBodh:** The objective was to invite people to submit any statistical query and get a quick solution. It was designed to attract more scholars.
- **Anapana:** It is the first session at morning where the students meditate in the classroom for better concentration.
- **Institute Research Day:** The motto was to inculcate a research environment among students.
- **Prof Hujurbazar memorial lecture:** Special approval was taken from the family of Prof Hujurbazar to conduct the memorial lecture. The main objective is to promote statistical understanding by reaching out to larger communities.
- **STAR of the month: Jan 2023:** This encourages students to participate in various co-curricular activities.

### Below mentioned are the few initiatives of SSI

- **Statistics Clinic:** It is a platform bridging the gap between researchers and statisticians. A clinic is an occasion where a professional expert gives advice or training. Any scientific inquiry relies on supporting empirical evidence. Relating empirical evidence to theoretical knowledge is of particular importance to statisticians. Statistical Clinic offers free consultation on the matters of research methodology, analysis, and policy advocacy to the broader research community. In regards to the free consultations, committee members suggested starting with chargeable consultations.
- **Lunch Talks:** G-lunch includes free talks, open discussions, remote area, slow learners, critical time, support students, and more engagement during the lockdown.
- **Stats-Talk:** It is a random talk walk to engage students with outside experts and alumni groups and networking to freshen the minds of the students.
